





These concerts usually were held both on the Friday and Saturday nights and were sold out both nights.

Earl cares for children of all ages whether in music or not– this was evident at the Children's Christmas Shopping Event held each year. During the morning Earl could be seen wearing a Santa hat walking around with a little child picking out Christmas Gifts. He never let on if he was frustrated or not – just seemed to enjoy being part of the fun.

Earl loves every aspect of the Church – he has served on the Foundation, the Board of Managers as well as being a Session Member for as long as I can remember. St. Andrew's and the people in it are his love and his life.

We Say Thanks

There are not enough words to express our thankfulness to Earl for his outstanding years, all 63 of them. His motto? The mind, heart and soul are motivated by the partnership of music and word. One cannot exist without the other. This is Earl through and through.

This does describe Earl and it is from his belief and ministry that St. Andrew's has been exposed and developed such a broad vision into so many varieties of music. If you have been a member of the choir sometime over this spread of years, you will have many memories that are positive. You would never have recognized arias or solos from the Messiah, recognized any of the Coronation anthems that he made us learn, appreciated anthems from earlier centuries and endured them, experienced gospel songs and old choruses from Sunday School days. He has grown over the years in accepting newer styles of anthems and new composers and has used the MIDI in the newly refurbished organ we currently have with all its technology.

Earl has led the choir through many activities as well. We were able to have and host Variety Concerts at the City Hall for several years with lots of fun activities to present. Years ago, before the Stratford Festival presented Musicals, the choir brought the K W Musical Productions to Stratford and sponsored for example – Hello Dolly, Anne of Green Gables and Bye Bye Birdie for a number of years as a means to raise money for different parts of the Church Life. For these productions we had to sell tickets, do promos (like participating in city parades), make sandwiches for receptions, be ushers - we did it all and then be on duty for Sunday services the next day. We have travelled to Kincardine, Guelph, Goderich, Woodstock, London and swapped choirs for a Church service. In Kincardine, we sang on their weekly Worship show on CKNX as well.

The Choir has hosted the Men's Chorus from Wales to a packed auditorium several times, worked with Central High School Students and participated in City Wide Choruses and Services. This man has been busy.

Throughout his career which includes teaching music in elementary schools throughout Perth County at the time and teaching English at the secondary level, he became involved with introducing Education Through Music in Ontario working with Mary Helen Richards from California developing this program. This included teaching at both University of Waterloo and the University of Windsor. And doing all of this, he rarely missed a Sunday of Worship with us.

The Stratford Boys Choir was initiated by Earl and then joined with Gordon Scott to make the choir what it was in its day. This choir was later carried on for years with Brian Emery at the helm – an Earl Clark music pupil. He was in the inaugural years of the Stratford Concert Choir and involved with the initial introduction of Stratford Summer Music years ago.

Earl has helped so many people of different ages with his talents in singing and playing the piano and the pipe organ. He is notorious within the Music Teacher Realm for being successful with teaching Theory and Music History. He does it all.

Earl came to Stratford at the young age of 25 (with much coercion) and after a few years was definite in his decision to make Stratford his home. He has shown us how he is not only a team member and part of St Andrew's life but also is part of the community of Stratford. We have been so lucky.

Earl has made St. Andrew's a singing congregation. Have you ever stood back and listened to us on a Sunday morning? We sing our hymns with vigor and meaning. If he lets the organ roar, we must match that enthusiasm with our voices. He just doesn't just play the hymns – he plays to the words of the hymns. It's true, take a listen on a Sunday morning but we just can't do it all at the same time!

Thank you, Earl, for 63 years of inspiration and love and guidance. You will surely be missed leading the musical ministry of St. Andrew's but now you can enjoy sitting in the pews and chances are, you could probably sit with someone different every Sunday. We love you!



What causes car sickness in children and how can I prevent it?

Car sickness is a type of motion sickness. Motion sickness occurs when the brain receives conflicting information from the inner ears, eyes, and nerves in the joints and muscles.

Imagine a young child sitting low in the back seat of a car without being able to see out the window — or an older child reading a book in the car. The child's inner ear will sense motion, but his or her eyes and body won't. The result might be an upset stomach, cold sweat, fatigue, loss of appetite or vomiting.

It's not clear why car sickness affects some children more than others. While the problem doesn't seem to affect most infants and toddlers, children ages 2 to 12 are particularly susceptible.

To prevent car sickness in children, you might try the following strategies:

Reduce sensory input. Encourage your child to look at things outside the car rather than focusing on books, games or screens. If your child naps, traveling during nap time might help.

Carefully plan pre-trip meals. Don't give your child a large meal immediately before or during car travel. If the trip will be long or your child needs to eat, give him or her a small, bland snack — such as dry crackers and a small drink — before it's time to go.

Provide air ventilation. Adequate air ventilation might help prevent car sickness. **Offer distractions.** If your child is prone to car sickness, try distracting him or her during car trips by talking, listening to music or singing songs.

Use medication. If you're planning a car trip, ask your child's doctor about using an over-the-counter antihistamine, such as dimenhydrinate (Dramamine) or diphenhydramine (Benadryl), to prevent car sickness. Both medications work best if taken about an hour before traveling. Read the product label carefully to determine the correct dose and be prepared for possible side effects, such as drowsiness. Nondrowsy antihistamines don't appear to be effective at treating motion sickness.


If your child starts to develop car sickness, stop the car as soon as possible and let your child get out and walk around or lie on his or her back for a few minutes with closed eyes. Placing a cool cloth on your child's forehead also might help.

If these tips don't help or if your child's car sickness makes travel difficult, talk to your child's doctor about other options.

Tuesday morning after gathering music, welcome & greetings, worship was conducted by Rev Mickal Schomburg. We had 3 delicious meals during our meeting. It was a great 2 days and these are just some of the highlights.


I hope that I haven't missed anyone & this gives you some insight into what happened at Synodical. I have the reports if anyone wishes a copy.

The Custodian's Corner

When you are the custodian/janitor of a building - you never know what to expect each time you enter the building....especially an old one.

Some days, you have bats flying around or lying on the floor....or you have squirrels running around in the attic of the Sanctuary. Every fall, when it is starting to cool down, there is an influx of mice in the kitchen. So, out come the traps laced with peanut butter and eventually, the mice disappear. In the Spring, there is a parade of ants in the kitchen....a cookie crumb becomes a moving, living mass of ants....and then they disappear.

When I come in the back door, I know almost immediately if something is amiss....a smell, a sound, a vibration and some mornings, the lights have been left on the downstairs bathrooms and you can hear the fans, or a toilet handle has stuck and the water is running. Some mornings, the boiler isn't heating the way it should and sometimes, the traps in the sewers are dry and you can smell the sewer gas.

It's almost like the building is a living, breathing thing....and it seems to know when I don't have the time or patience to deal with it.

Anyway, I love the building. I hope it lasts forever!

The Earth is the Lord's

Happy Spring and Gardening TIme:

Doing God's work includes looking after the land as well as gardening for food security. We can grow food without using chemicals (amend soil with compost, manure, etc.) and get outside to enjoy nature in the somewhat fresh air.

Due to the hotter summers we have been having the last number of years, I have been changing my strategies for gardening. I have put my lettuce in containers that can be moved so that they can receive some morning sun and then shade as the sun's position changes through the season. The hot weather makes the lettuce bolt quickly and early in the season. It is usually about 10 degrees cooler in the shade, especially if coming from being under a tree and getting a breeze. It is worth thinking about planting shrubs or trees to help with cooling. Tree canopy coverage of 10% is a good figure to work towards for your property. Having large trees can make it difficult when you want sun for growing things so you also should think about location and the distance to structures because trees like willows can be hard on foundations. A rule of thumb is that the root system below ground is similar to the canopy of leaves above ground. Something to think about.

As well, this year I am going to use a shade covering over my vegetables while allowing the breeze to go through. The heat has been a negative factor for getting a good crop for my beets, swiss chard and beans especially. Also, my onions last year were getting critters, like squirrels digging and ruining the roots, so my crop was not very good. Not sure what I will do about that. I did add some of my compost to all my gardening containers last year and will do so again this year to amend the soil which gives nutrients. The other part of the picture is saving water and therefore having water barrels collect all the rain we have been getting, especially in the spring because June starts getting hot and dry. The warmer water rather than cool or cold water from a hose is better, I think, for the plants and should have more beneficial elements in them because the water from the hose has been treated.

One of the books I have been reading is "How to Be a Climate Optimist: Blueprints for A Better World' by Chris Turner which I found to be very well written and very informative. I haven't finished it yet, but it is very thought provoking, so I read a bit at a time to allow the information to sit with me to make sense of the concepts. Well worth reading.
